MANDATORY CONDITIONS

No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:

- a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
- b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.

Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

The admission of children to the exhibition of any film is restricted by age classification awarded to the film by the British Board of Film Classification.

Where-

the film classification is not specified admission of children must be restricted in accordance with the recommendation of the licensing authority.

- "children" means under 18.

- (1) Where individuals are at the premises to carry out a security activity such as door supervision, each such individual must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.
- (2) But nothing in subsection (1) requires such a condition to be imposed:
 - (a) in respect of premises within paragraph (8)(3)(a) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001 (c12) (premises with premises licence authorising only plays or films), or
 - (b) in respect of premises in relation to-
 - (i) any occasion mentioned in paragraph 8(3)(b) or (c) of that Schedule (premises being used exclusively by club with club premises certificate, under a temporary event notice authorising plays or films or under a gaming licence), or
 - (ii) any occasion within paragraph 8(3)(d) of that Schedule (occasions prescribed by regulations under that Act).
- (3) For the purposes of this section:
 - (a) "security activity" means an activity to which paragraph 2 (1)(a) of that Schedule applies, and
 - (b) paragraph 8(5) of that Schedule (interpretation of references to an occasion) applies as it applies in relation to paragraph 8 of that Schedule.

CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE

I have undertaken my own risk assessment to take the following proposed steps.

The types of regulated entertainment proposed materially do no more than reinstate the normal pub entertainment that was previously unregulated as identified in B1 above. No new steps have been identified in relation to the four licensing objectives save as below.

No further risks have been identified which need to be addressed, save as below:

- 1. Any person exercising a security activity (as defined by paragraph 2(1)(a) of schedule 2 of the Private Security Industry Act 2001) shall be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.
- 2. Such a person will be employed at the premises at the discretion of the designated premises supervisor/holder of the Premises Licence.
- 3. Any person as defined in condition (1) will clearly display his name badge at all times whilst on duty.
- 4. No customers apparently carrying open bottles upon entry shall be admitted to the premises at any times the premises are open to the public.
- 5. Where CCTV is installed with recording facilities such recordings shall be retained for a period of 30 days and made available within a reasonable time upon request by the police.
- 6. Alcoholic and other drinks may not be removed from the premises in open containers save for consumption in any external area provided for that purpose.

No further risks have been identified which need to be addressed, save as below:

- 1. To comply with the reasonable requirements of the fire officer from time to time.
- 2. To comply with the reasonable requirements of the building control officer.

No further risks have been identified which need to be addressed, save as below:

- 1. Where appropriate, prominent, clear and legible notices shall be displayed at all exits requesting the public respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and area quietly.
- 2. Noise or vibration shall not emanate from the premises so as to cause a nuisance to nearby properties.

The restrictions set out in the Licensing Act 2003 will apply. No unusual or additional risks of harm to children have been identified. No films or videos of any description will be shown so that they can be viewed by persons under the age of any applicable BBFC/Local Authority certification. Children under the age of 16 shall not be permitted to enter the premises after 2100.

The licence also authorises licensable activities until 0000 Sundays for each bank holiday, Christmas Eve and Boxing Day.

From 10.00 New Year's Eve 31/12 to terminable hour following New Years Day 1/1

The licence authorises licensable activities during the broadcast of televised sporting events of national or international interest outside of permitted hours on written notice 7 days prior to the event to both Police and Licensing Authority of the nature of the event and the proposed hours – save only that the police do not serve counter notice on the DPS on crime and disorder grounds.

In the event of the Secretary of State declaring by order national or international events, the condition falls in favour of that declared in the order.
