### **Annex 1 – MANDATORY CONDITIONS**

1. Any supply of alcohol for consumption off the premises must be made at a time when the premises are open for the purposes of supplying alcohol, in accordance with the club premises certificate, to members of the club for consumption on the premises.
2. Any alcohol supplied for consumption off the premises must be in a sealed container.
3. Any supply of alcohol for consumption off the premises must be made to a Member of the club in person.

### **Mandatory conditions imposed by virtue of The Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Licensing Conditions) Order 2010**

4. (1) The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.  
  
(2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises in a manner which carries a significant risk of leading or contributing to crime and disorder, prejudice to public safety, public nuisance, or harm to children–
  - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to–
    - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
    - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
  - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Act);
  - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;
  - (d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where that provision is dependent on–
    - (i) the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or
    - (ii) the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;
  - (e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
5. The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
6. The responsible person shall ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
7. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.  
(2) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.

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8. The responsible person shall ensure that–
- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures–
    - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
    - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
    - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
  - (b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

**NB** "responsible person" has the meaning given in paragraphs (a) and (b) of the definition in section 153(4) of the Licensing Act 2003 (ie premises licence holder (PLH), designated premises supervisor (DPS) or any individual over 18 years of age authorised by the PLH or DPS.

### Minimum Drink Pricing –

1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
2. For the purpose of the condition set out in paragraph 1 –
  - (a) "duty" is to be constructed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979.
  - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula –  $P = D + (D \times V)$

Where –

- (i) P is the permitted price
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence–
  - (i) The holder of the premises licence
  - (ii) The designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
  - (iii) The personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.

3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from the paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

4. (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

(2). The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

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### **If the Premises Licence allows Exhibition of Films –**

1. Where a premises licence authorises the exhibition of films, the licence must include a condition requiring the admission of children to the exhibition of any film to be restricted in accordance with this section.
2. Where the film classification body is specified in the licence, unless subsection (3)(b) applies, admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation by that body.
3. Where – (a) The film classification body is not specified in the licence, or (b) The relevant licensing authority had notified the holder of the licence that this subsection applies to the film in question, admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that licensing authority.
4. In this section “children” means any person aged under 18; and “film classification body” means the person or persons designated as the authority under Section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984(c39) (authority to determine suitability of video works for classification).
  - (a) to an occasion) applies as it applies in relation to paragraph 8 of that Schedule.

### **Annex 2 - CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE**

- a) **General – all four licensing objectives (b, c, d, e) – to abide by exiting health, safety and fire safety requirements.**
- b) **The prevention of crime and disorder – installation of monitored CCTV at the shooting lodge. Signs notifying patrons that CCTV is being used throughout the grounds and monitored continually in order to prevent any criminal behaviour. The premises has been fitted with an eight camera high definition system which can be monitored from the premises and also remotely from individual computers and is at current BS standard 7958 to afford good facial recognition, with the recordings to be retained for a minimum of 31 days and must be in operation during hours of licensable activities. The system gives a recording of cars entering and leaving the premises with the camera that is capable of recording registration numbers, a full view of the car park area, outdoor seating areas and high security ammunition store and the club house, both outside and inside. The recording capabilities are in excess of 31 days. The recordings will be made available to responsible authorities as requested and provided within reasonable time. Members of staff and supervisors will receive ongoing training which will include the operation of the CCTV system. They will be able to: (1) Operate the CCTV. (2) Provide viewing immediately on request, but in accordance with the Data Protection Act 1988 (DPA). (3) Provide copies of footage, again in accordance with the DPA. Ensure staff CCTV training is regular, fully recorded and retained. Drinking is restricted to within the curtilage of the building and outdoor seating and picnic area. Proof of age scheme (No ID, no sale).**
- c) **Public safety – ensure members of the club, their guests and members of the public have securely stowed their guns prior to consuming alcohol on shooting days and will not return to the shooting stands to continue shooting. Staff must be trained in checking customer’s ages by only accepting the following identification: passport, drivers licence and Citizen Card.**
- d) **The prevention of public nuisance – adequate bins in and around the shooting club to minimize litter. Curfew of 11pm for playing music and serving alcohol.**
- e) **The protection of children from harm – ensure that children under 16 are accompanied by an adult, whilst on the club premises in line with statutory requirements. Staff must be trained in checking customer’s ages by only accepting the following identification in order to serve alcohol: passport, driving licence and Citizen Card.**
