North Warwickshire Community Safety Partnership Update

Report of the Chief Executive

1 Summary

- 1.1 This report provides Members with an update on recent activities with the North Warwickshire Community Safety Partnership.
- 1.2 The report includes information about progress with the agreed priorities from the Strategic Assessment 2020/21 and latest crime statistics.

Recommendation to the Sub-Committee

- a That Members consider the update and identify any areas for further scrutiny and consideration; and
- b Members note progress of the North Warwickshire Community Safety Partnership Plan 2021/22.

2 Consultation

2.1 Consultation has taken place with the relevant Members and any comments received will be reported at the meeting.

3 Background

- 3.1 The Sub-Committee has previously received reports from the North Warwickshire Community Safety Partnership regarding progress with the actions included in the partnership plan. The last report was received in November 2021.
- 3.2 Attached at Appendix A is a copy of quarter 3 Community Safety Performance
 Monitoring Report for the 2020/21 year along with the latest Community
 Safety Partnership Plan at Appendix B.
 - 3.3 The Sub Committee will note that the CSP priorities were agreed as part of the Strategic Assessment process. These were previously reviewed annually but will now be done every 4 years (although the first cycle is 3 years in length) which means that the current priorities will remain in place until March 2024.

- 3.4 The priorities will then be reviewed, and new priorities agreed based on the new Strategic Assessment report. Warwickshire County Council later this year will be holding Countywide MoRiLE scoring sessions which enable discussions to be had to identify any new/emerging issues across the County. The district CSP's will be informed of any specific emerging issues and present these to their Q3 22/23 CSP Board where board members can decide whether to add it to the priorities. The intention is not to remove any priorities at that point, just to add any new ones, if needed.
- 3.5 The quarter 3 report provides an overview of recorded crime and disorder in north Warwickshire and shows the following position, comparing back over the last 12 months plus three-year average. It must be noted that the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic and consequent lockdowns occurred throughout 2020/21 and as such any comparisons to this period must take account of irregular trends during this time.
 - **Violent Crime** Violence with injury offences have dropped below the 3-year average for the borough during quarter 3, although remaining higher than last year. In comparison, violence without injury remains a risk area for the CSP with volumes remaining high.
 - Domestic abuse related violence has seen only small increases compared to the 3-year average during this quarter. In addition, volumes have slightly reduced in Q3 compared to Q2 this year, and this is despite seasonal trends which would normally indicate higher volumes over the Christmas period. This may suggest a lack of willingness to report offences or a genuine reduction in offences occurring.
 - Knife Crime offences involving a knife continue to be lower than the 3-year average for North Warwickshire Borough. However, it is evident that section 18 wounding offences remain a risk area for the CSP, due to continued higher volumes than the 3-year average and the seriousness of this offence. There is no update from YJS for this quarter at the time of writing.
 - Alcohol related violence Violent offences involving alcohol have increased compared to last year although much of Q3 last year involved a national lockdown over the festive season limiting opportunities for this type of violence to occur. Less than 10% of all violence involved alcohol in the borough this quarter suggesting that this is not a significant motivating factor.
 - Other Sexual Offences volumes of offences have more than doubled in Q3 compared to last year, with increases also compared to previous quarters. This suggests a possible emerging issue in the borough, with most offences being 'current' (i.e., not historical). It is recommended that further research is carried out to understand this issue.
 - Serious Acquisitive Crime All areas of serious acquisitive crime remain at much lower volumes than in previous years. However, seasonal trends suggest higher volumes are likely to occur during Q3 and Q4, and this

does appear to be the case for vehicle crime during Q3, compared to Q2. Therefore, it is likely that volumes of these offences will continue to increase during Q4, although remaining below levels seen in previous years. It is recommended that the CSP plan activity to prevent increases in vehicle crime during Q4.

- Rural Crime Data for December 2021 is not yet available and as such the Q3 figure is not a full total. However, offences recorded as part of the Rural and Wildlife Crime Strategy continue to remain much lower than the long-term trend, with quarter-on-quarter reductions in line with seasonal trends.
- **Killed and Seriously Injured** After the spike in KSIs in August 2021 during Q2, volumes have returned to similar levels seen last year during Q3. Indeed, volumes of KSIs remain below the 3-year average. There were no fatal incidents this guarter
- Perception of Crime available data from the Street Safe* tool indicates that 22% of the 360 responses in Warwickshire between 2nd September and 18th January 2022 related to areas in North Warwickshire Borough (79 responses). Key findings are:
 - 1. Many reports came from the northern part of the borough.
 - 2. Badly lit areas were the most prominent environmental concern.
 - 3. Where stated, 'verbal harassment from groups of strangers' and/or 'feeling like you are being followed' were the main behavioural concerns.
 - 4. Evenings and overnight (from 4pm onwards) were the most likely time for incidents to occur.

Analysis as part of the Safer Streets project has also identified 3 hotspots for responses – Newton, Regis, and Warton Ward, Polesworth/Dordon and Coleshill/Water Orton.

- Reoffending rates in the borough are continuing to increase, moving closer to the county average, and indicating a possible emerging issue for the district. Despite a peak in the number of reoffences per reoffender in 2018, the overall trend shows that those who do reoffend in the borough are less likely to commit more reoffences than the county average.
- Exploitation Overall data relating to referrals and identification of child exploitation and MSHT remains very low in the borough. As highlighted in the Q2 report, this may suggest a lack of identification and awareness. Although referrals to Children and Families Front Door (previously MASH) from North Warwickshire Borough are at the lowest in the county, volumes have increased this quarter despite all other CSP areas showing reductions. It is recommended that awareness raising activities are considered in the borough.
- **Schools Exclusions** Persistent absence from school continues to be an issue for the borough, with the highest rates in the county for secondary schools and the second highest for primary schools. Permanent and fixed

term exclusion rates for secondary school pupils in the borough are at some of the highest in Warwickshire, above the county average.

- **Substance Misuse** –There have not been any referrals to Compass during Q2 and Q3 for North Warwickshire Borough. There are no updates available from CGL for this quarter at the time of writing.
- Domestic Abuse Domestic abuse offences have reduced in the borough during this quarter compared to Q2, and this trend is also reflected in referrals to Refuge. However, volumes remain higher than last year. In comparison, referrals to DACS have increased to 30 referrals during Q3 this year.
- **Hate crime** After the worryingly high volumes of hate crime in the borough and indeed across the county during Q1&2, volumes have now reduced in Q3. However, they remain at higher levels than the 3-year average, indicating that this is still an area of concern for the CSP. Racist related hate crime remains the main type of hate crime in the borough.
- **Positive areas** The North Safer Neighbourhood Team has seen reductions in areas of concern during this quarter, compared to last year. This is most significant in violence without injury offences (-8 offences) and hate offences (-6).
- Areas of concern The risk areas for Section18 offences this quarter are Atherstone Central Ward (+3 offences) and almost all wards in the West SNT area.
- Almost all wards in the South and West SNT areas have seen increases in violence without injury offences compared to last year, most notably in Fillongley Ward (+11 offences) and Hurley and Wood End Ward (+7).
- Personal ASB For the first time this year, personal ASB is showing increases compared to the 3-year average (5.2% increase, equivalent to 2 incidents above the 3 years quarterly average of 45). This is despite the absence of multiple days of ASB data that is currently missing from the totals for December 2021 which may increase personal ASB volumes even further. This represents a possible emerging issue for the CSP, and the table shows that Atherstone Central Ward is an area of concern here. It is recommended that the specific locations are identified, and vulnerabilities assessed.

4 Partnership Plan 2020/21 – Quarter 3 Updates

4.1 The North Warwickshire Community Safety Partnership has a statutory requirement to prepare a Partnership Plan based upon the findings of the annual Strategic Assessment. The existing Partnership Plan has been reviewed and updated in line with the agreed priorities and recommendations identified in the 2021/22 Strategic Assessment.

- 4.2 The North Warwickshire Responsible Authorities Group agreed the priorities and the updated Partnership Plan at its meeting on the 23 June 2021.
- 4.3 Attached at Appendix B is the current Partnership Plan 2021/22 and include individual partnership plan updates.
- 4.4 Chaired by Allison Wiggin, Problem Solving Meetings are held monthly when problem solving plans are discussed. These are informed by the latest crime statistics, any emerging issues raised by partners and the Police. The latest meetings considered issues around Atherstone Road, Hartshill, alongside rising levels of bike nuisances, fly tipping and developing a plan to address youth related anti-social behaviour in the parishes of Hartshill and Arley. Updates are included below:
 - Operation Alarity has reduced the level of activity of county lines drug dealing in North Warwickshire however there has been some concern around young people and Hartshill School. There is ongoing work at local schools and as part of the County Lines Intensification Week commencing 7 March 2022 a poster and stickers are being produced to display in schools as a screen saver on school computers as well as distributed to youth groups. A poster will also be prepared and circulated to parish councils, job centre, pharmacies.
 - Operation Array has now closed however following an increase again in the number of reports of off-road bike nuisances at various locations more targeted work has taken place. The Rural crime Team has held an organised weekend patrolling local known spots. The work was very successful and as a result a further weekend is planned this month. It was often people outside of the area as opposed to local people causing the ASB.
 - Work on the review of the Street Cruising Injunction is being revisited again following a judgement on a national case that was overturned.
 - Production of seasonal trends data has been compiled to help inform campaign work and crime prevention activities over the next 12 months.
 - A couple of crime prevention engagement events have been held at Warton/Austrey and Polesworth to address a spike in vehicle crime
 - An internal fly tipping group has been established at NWBC to try and identify a camera solution for this environmental crime. Hot spots include Folly Lane, Baddesley Ensor, Grange Road, Hartshill & Packington Lane Coleshill). The project will look at signage, camera's, investigations, case interviews & prosecution plus a social media campaign to try and address the problem. An application has also been made to the Police and Crime Commissioner to re-direct some existing funding to support this project.
 - Ask for Angela is the name of a campaign in England that started in 2016 that is used by bars and other venues to keep people safe from sexual assault by using a codeword to identify when they are in danger or are in an uncomfortable situation. When an establishment uses this program, a

person who believes themselves to be in danger can ask for Angela, a fictitious member of the staff. The staff will then help the person get home discreetly and safely by either escorting them to a different room, calling them a taxi and escorting them to it, or by asking the other party member to leave the establishment. The programme is being rolled out in North and will target priority locations first.

- 4.5 The multi-agency anti-social behaviour tasking and case management meetings continue to be held monthly. The latest meeting was held in February. There have seen some new case management plans discussed.

5. Community Safety Grant 2021/22

- 5.1 The Police and Crime Commissioner has confirmed the allocations to the Warwickshire Community Safety Partnerships. Following discussions with representatives of the partnerships across Warwickshire a co-ordinated response to the reductions was agreed. The allocation for the North Warwickshire Community Safety Partnership is as expected to be £22,469.00 a reduction of £9,922.00 from the 2020/22 allocation of £32,391.00.
- 5.2 The community safety grant will support the following:

6 Safer Warwickshire Officer

- 6.1 As reported at the last meeting the Community Safety Partnership planned to support the pilot of the Safer Warwickshire Officer in North Warwickshire. An initial allocation of funding of £5,000 from the community safety grant allocation in 2021/22 had been made to help deliver specific initiatives arising from the work of the new role. Work on recruiting to the post has been delayed and sadly did not proceed. A request was made to the OPCC to use the remaining funds for a fly tipping project that has been approved and highlighted above.
- 6.2 The CSP has made an application for three projects from the Community Safety 2022/3 grant application. The fund's total £23,000 and includes:

Serious Violence Mentoring Programme (£3k)

In brief the programme has two critical elements. Firstly, to identify and train skilled mentors who can work with young people aged 14-25 who are at risk of becoming involved in serious violent lifestyles and secondly the programme will identify and train local people who will become community mentors. Community mentors will be offered training and support and will be involved in voluntary mentoring under the supervision of our training provider and our skilled mentors.

Local Community Safety Fund (£5k)

The local community safety fund is money available that can be used to help deliver against the North Warwickshire Community Safety priorities by supporting initiatives/interventions that reduce crime in line with the partnerships core priorities including (but not exclusive):

- Violent Crime With a focus on knife crime, domestic violence and alcohol related violence.
- Serious Acquisitive Crime- With a focus on residential burglary dwelling, vehicle crime and personal robbery.
- Rural Crime Based upon the rural and wildlife crime strategy definition.
- Road Safety With a focus on traffic accidents resulting in killed and serious injuries.

• Safer Communities Rural Partnership Officer (£15k)

Whilst North Warwickshire is a safe place to live, work and visit the fear of crime remains particularly high therefore the proposal is to appoint a dedicated person to create a recognisable presence in communities to coordinate and support community safety events whilst helping deliver the partnership priorities. The post will help to reduce crime by connecting and creating cohesive communities and identifying what matters locally to help understand the complexities that create the fear of crime in North Warwickshire. By connecting and strengthening communities the Partnership will improve community resilience by,

- supporting the elderly and vulnerable by aiding, advice, and support,
- fostering community cohesion and wellbeing,
- assisting with navigating to other services that help support a better quality of life,
- · promoting community involvement,
- addressing social inclusion, especially among young people

The postholder will also be expected to set up events promptly should there be a spike in criminal behaviour observed locally.

The approach will focus on public reassurance, Safer Streets, Women and Children and work such as County-Lines as well as deter anti-social behaviour.

7 Summary

7.1 Members are requested to note the report and the progress updates provided by the North Warwickshire Community Safety Partnership and identify any areas for further consideration.

8 Report Implications

8.1 Finance and Value for Money Implications

8.1.1 The reduction of £9,922.00 in the 2021/22 community safety grant for North Warwickshire will make it more difficult to support individual community safety projects and has resulted in some difficult conversations about future long-term projects and how these will be funded.

8.2 Safer Communities Implications

8.2.1 These are set in the report and the appendices.

8.3 Legal, Data Protection and Human Rights Implications

- 8.3.1 Community Safety Partnerships were introduced by the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 and most recently amended by the Policing and Crime Act 2009. It is a requirement that the Council works with the police, the fire and rescue authority and the county council to implement a strategy for the reduction of crime. The recommendations in this report and the revised partnership plan contribute to the discharge of that requirement.
- 8.3.2 The deployment of CCTV and ANPR cameras are subject to several legal provisions, including the Protection of Freedoms Act, General Data Protection Regulation, Human Rights Act, and others. The deployment is also subject to guidance prepared by the Information Commissioner's Office and the Surveillance Camera Commissioner.
- 8.3.3 The Council is required to have a committee that scrutinises the crime and disorder work of various organisations within the Borough. The Council has decided that this Committee will fulfil that requirement.

8.4 Environment and Sustainability Implications

8.4.1 By working to reduce crime and disorder, the partnership is contributing towards improving the quality of life for residents, businesses, and visitors to North Warwickshire.

8.5 **Health Implications**

8.5.1 The work of the partnership has several synergies with contributing towards healthier communities. These include tackling violent crime, supporting victims of domestic abuse, tackling alcohol and drug misuse, and reducing anti-social behaviour.

8.6 Risk Management Implications

8.6.1 The Community Safety Partnership Strategic Assessment includes risk analysis of risk and harm. The analysis uses an adapted Association of Chief Police Officers' Model (ACPO 3 PLEM). This is a basis scoring matrix for levels of harm. The assessment also includes consideration of a Management of Risk in Law Enforcement (MORILE) matrix. The key risks for the partnership are identified within the strategic assessment prepared each year.

8.7 Equality Implications

8.7.1 The work of the partnership includes several activities which contribute towards equality objectives. These include support services for victims of domestic abuse, reducing repeat victimisation, monitoring of hate crimes and rehabilitation of offenders.

8.8 Links to Council's Priorities

8.8.1 The Council has a priority for creating safer communities.

Violent Crime - Violence with injury offences have dropped below the 3 year average for the borough during quarter 3, although remaining higher than last year. In comparison, violence without injury remains a risk area for the CSP with volumes remaining high. **Domestic abuse related violence** has seen only small increases compared to the 3 year average during this quarter. In addition, volumes have slightly reduced in Q3 compared to Q2 this year, and this is despite seasonal trends which would normally indicate higher volumes over the Christmas period. This may suggest a lack of willingness to report offences or a genuine reduction in offences occurring.

Knife Crime - offences involving a knife continue to be lower than the 3 year average for North Warwickshire Borough. However, it is evident that section 18 wounding offences remain a risk area for the CSP, due to continued higher volumes than the 3 year average and also the seriousness of this offence. There is no update from YJS for this quarter at the time of writing.

Alcohol related violence – Violent offences involving alcohol have increased compared to last year although much of Q3 last year involved a national lockdown over the festive season limiting opportunities for this type of violence to occur. Less than 10% of all violence involved alcohol in the borough this quarter suggesting that this is not a significant motivating factor.

Other Sexual Offences – volumes of offences have more than doubled in Q3 compared to last year, with increases also compared to previous quarters. This suggestion for the borough, with the majority of offences being 'current' (i.e. not historical). It is recommended that further research is carried out to understand this issue.

Serious Acquisitive Crime – All areas of serious acquisitive crime remain at much lower volumes than in previous years. However, seasonal trends suggest higher volumes are likely to occur during Q3 and Q4, and this does appear to be the case for vehicle crime during Q3, compared to Q2. Therefore, it is likely that volumes of these offences will continue to increase during Q4, although still remaining below levels seen in previous years. It is recommended that the CSP plan activity to prevent increases in vehicle crime during Q4.

Rural Crime – Data for December 2021 is not yet available and as such the Q3 figure is not a full total. However, offences recorded as part of the Rural and Wildlife Crime Strategy continue to remain much lower than the long term trend, with quarter on quarter reductions in line with seasonal trends.




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


Perception of Crime – available data from the StreetSafe* tool indicates that 22% of the 360 responses in Warwickshire between 2nd September and 18th January 2022 related to areas in North Warwickshire Borough (79 responses). Key findings are:

- The majority of reports came from the northern part of the borough.
- Badly lit areas were the most prominent environmental concern.
- Where stated, 'verbal harassment from groups of strangers' and/or 'feeling like you are being followed' were the main behavioural concerns.
- Evenings and overnight (from 4pm onwards) were the most likely time for incidents to occur.

Analysis as part of the Safer Streets project has also identified 3 hotspots for responses – Newton, Regis and Warton Ward, Polesworth/Dordon and Coleshill/Water Orton.



Exploitation - Overall data relating to referrals and identification of child exploitation and MSHT remains very low in the borough. As highlighted in the Q2 report, this may suggest a lack of identification and awareness. Although referrals to Children and Families Front Door (previously MASH) from North Warwickshire Borough are at the lowest in the county, volumes have increased this quarter despite all other CSP areas showing reductions. *It is recommended that awareness raising activities are considered in the borough.*

Schools Exclusions - Persistent absence from school continues to be an issue for the borough, with the highest rates in the county for secondary schools and the second highest for primary schools. Permanent and fixed term exclusion rates for secondary school pupils in the borough are at some of the highest in Warwickshire, above the county average.


Substance Misuse –There have not been any referrals to Compass during Q2 and Q3 for North Warwickshire Borough. There are no updates available from CGL for this quarter at the time of writing.

North Warwickshire Improving Road Safety Action Plan Progress Report

1 Summary

1.1 This report provides Members with an update on the progress with the North Warwickshire Road Safety Action Plan. The report also outlines recent road safety developments and feedback from the Warwickshire Road Safety Partnership Operational Board held in October 2021.

Recommendation to the Sub-Committee

That Members note the report and consider the progress made to date.

2 Consultation

2.1 Consultation has taken place with the relevant Members and any comments received will be reported at the meeting.

3 Background

- 3.1 A North Warwickshire road safety action plan was agreed by this Sub-Committee at a meeting held on the 16 March 2016.
- 3.2 Progress with the action plan is challenging and requires further development with partners, including Warwickshire County Council, Warwickshire Fire and Rescue Service, Warwickshire Police, and others. Warwickshire County Council is the lead authority for road safety in Warwickshire and has various statutory duties to promote road safety. At a local level, road safety is being championed by this Council and it is also one of the priorities for the North Warwickshire Community Safety Partnership. The work starting to emerge from the Warwickshire Road Safety Partnership is encouraging and is developing more collaborative work to improve road safety in Warwickshire.

4 Warwickshire Road Safety Partnership

- 4.1 Members were previously informed about the re-establishment of the Warwickshire Road Safety Partnership and the adoption of the Partnership Strategy (2021-2030). The strategy will be delivered through the strategic board which will be supported by the Operational Board which will be further supported by the Data Working Group, Communications Working Group and Partnership Co-ordinator.
- 4.2 The target for the partnership is to reduce the Killed and Seriously Injured casualties by 50% to 183. To achieve the five areas of focus have been identified as Safe Speeds, Safe Vehicles, Safe Roads, Safe Road Users and Post Collision Response.
- 4.3 During November Kingsbury Water Park and Atherstone Library hosted events as park of Brake Road Safety Week. Three days of action in January resulted in seven section 59 warnings, one motorcycle and one car seizure for having no insurance and 2 stolen motorcycles being recovered.
- 4.4 Road improvements have recently been finished on Blythe Road in Coleshill which included re-surfacing, improvements to the safety barrier and improved signage to address loss of control incidents.
- 4.5 Average Speed Cameras are to be installed in the Autumn of this year along the A446 between the A38 and A4091. A further scheme is being developed at Coleshill crossroads (High Street and Blythe Road) looking to introduce traffic signals to the junction. Funding is also being sought from HS2 road safety fund to introduce traffic signals at Furnace End crossroads. Other locations identified for improvement but without funding are Fillongley crossroads, Astley Crossroads (Red Lane) and Trinity Road T-Junction.

5 North Warwickshire Action Plan Updates

- 5.1 The updates to the action plan are shown in the appendix and some key updates highlighted below: -
 - Killed and Seriously Injured casualties have returned to expected levels after a spike in quarter two. There were no fatal incidents in Quarter 3.
 - The Safer Neighbourhoods Team now support 15 active Village Community Speed Watch Schemes in North Warwickshire. Each village has numerous sites (43 in total) where they can conduct speed operations following training from local officers which more recently has included use of laser equipment. Fillongley is the most recent village to be supported through the scheme. A new app has also been released to streamline the issuing of warning letters to any drivers caught speeding by the scheme.
 - A Street Cruising Injunction was granted by the High Court in Birmingham covering the whole of the Borough of North Warwickshire (NWBC) to tackle the problems of Street Cruising which was effective between 3 August 2018 and 22 June 2021 with a requirement for review after 18 months. During 2019 a barrister was instructed to take enforcement

action against an individual that was apprehended in North Warwickshire and to assist in the preparation for a review of the NWBC injunction. However, around that time there were a series of cases decided by the High Court which cast doubt on the validity of Injunctions against 'Persons Unknown' which held up the process until an appeal was heard in January 2022 which overturned those earlier decisions. The Barrister has been asked to re-advise based on this later judgment and assist in preparing a new application. Steps are also being taken to update any evidence that had already been gathered in support of the Car Cruising Injunction.

 Environmental Changes have been provided in New Arley to deter access to land where nuisance motorcycles have been reported. Local operations are planned to address the recent increase in reports of nuisance motorcycles.

6 **Summary**

6.1 Members are requested to note the progress made to date and consider the feedback from the Warwickshire Road Safety Partnership Operational Board, and the updates included in the report.

7 Report Implications

7.1 Financial Implications

7.1.1 Additional expenditure on road safety may be required if specific projects and initiatives are developed. Any future expenditure will need to be allocated from existing Corporate Policy and Safer Communities reserves. Road Safety project funding of £360.98 has been allocated from the 2021/22 community safety grant allocation for the North Warwickshire Community Safety Partnership. This has supported the purchase of a tripod for a community speed watch scheme.

7.2 Safer Communities Implications

7.2.1 These are set out in the report and appendix.

7.3 Environment and Sustainability Implications

7.3.1 By working to improve road safety in the Borough, this will contribute positively towards improving the quality of life and safety of local people and visitors to North Warwickshire.

7.4 **Health Implications**

7.4.1 The work of the Road Safety Partnership will have crossover links which will contribute towards healthy communities, including reducing deaths and injuries and preventing alcohol and drugs misuse.

7.5 Risk Management Implications

7.5.1 Road Safety on a Warwickshire level is improved through the partnership work of the Warwickshire Road Safety Partnership. The partnerships include Warwickshire County Council, Warwickshire Fire and Rescue, Public Health, Community Safety and Road Safety Teams, Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner and Highways England.

7.6 **Equality Implications**

7.6.1 Some of the road safety campaigns and education programmes will be targeted for groups including young people and vulnerable people.

7.7 Links to Council's Priorities

7.7.1 Road Safety is included in the priorities for the Council as part of the Creating Safer Communities priority.
