It must be noted that the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic and consequent lockdowns occurred throughout 2020/21 and as such any long term trends including this time period must take into account irregular trends during this time.

As of Q2 2021 additional partner data has been included to provide CSPs with a broader overview of trends relating to the priorities. As this is a new process, some data comparisons may not yet be available.

North Warwickshire CSP Priorities for 2021-2025





Performance – North Warwickshire CSP Priority – 1) Violent crime with a focus on knife crime, domestic abuse and alcohol related violence Serious Violence priorities – Domestic Violence



Violence offences are lower than last year, though offence volumes this quarter are the highest for violence without injury and higher than last quarter for violence with injury, which is in contrast to expected seasonal trends.

Atherstone town centre LSOA has seen the most violence offences this quarter (23), and Hartshill North & Caldecote LSOA the second highest (21).

Over two thirds of the reported violent offences this guarter occurred in a home address (69%). Fifty-nine offences occurred in the street (16%). Seventeen offences occurred in six schools this quarter.

FYTD vs LY

Volumes of **domestic related violence with injury** offences are lower year to date than last year, but domestic related violence without injury offences are similar to last year. Indeed, 31% of overall violence with injury offences so far this year in the borough are domestic related. However, analysis suggests that the increase is not in high-risk incidents with increases only in medium risk DARAs and referrals to Refuge this year are slightly lower than last year.

Knife related violence offences overall this year are lower than last year. All incidents this quarter resulted in injury, with five occurring in the home (the other in the street) and four of them having a domestic flag.

Residential Burglary offence volumes are similar to last year due to a lower number of offences in Q4, compared to a 10% increase countywide. Volumes of offences in the borough remain below pre-pandemic levels. **Dordon Rural LSOA** (4) recorded the most offences in this latest quarter. Offences have varied however vehicles were the target in a number of offences this quarter.

Vehicle offence volumes are higher than last year, despite seeing reductions in Q4. There continue to be offences at Corley services, contributing to volumes within **Corley LSOA**. However, most offences were spread across the borough. Items taken included number plates from cars and tools from vans. It is also evident from analysis that cars are being left unlocked, leaving them vulnerable to vehicle crime, particularly thefts from vehicles.

NW CSP to consider crime prevention advice for residents to remember to lock their vehicles even if only away from them for a short time.

There were six **personal robbery offences** during this latest quarter, one of which involved a knife. Three of these offences took place on the street, and three in private dwellings. Overall offences this year have seen an 8% reduction on last year, however these offences are small in number.

Rural Crime – Rural crime and incidents dealt with by the Warwickshire Rural Crime Team this financial year have ended slightly lower than last year (238 offences compared to 254 in 2023/24, a 6% reduction). Op Snap reports are now being included in the rural crime data and this relates to all incidents involving equine and livestock on roads. A third of the reports in the borough this quarter relate to these incidents (18 incidents, 32%). Fly tipping and fuel related rural crime have reduced during this latest quarter. In addition, as mentioned last quarter, incidents at farms have increased but this is also due to the team now dealing with all incidents on farms.



Performance – North Warwickshire CSP Priority – 4) Road Safety with a focus on road traffic accidents resulting in Killed or Seriously Injured (KSI)

Performance – North Warwickshire CSP Cross-Cutting Theme – Public Perception of Crime

KSI – At year end, collisions involving **fatalities** are at lower levels than last year, with one **fatal** KSI compared to 9 in the year 2023/24. In terms of incidents resulting in serious injuries, these numbers are exactly the same as last year (56 incidents).



Perception of Crime – There have been no reports to the Streetsafe tool from residents of North Warwickshire Borough during this latest quarter and only one in total for the whole year. This related to 'verbal harassment from a stranger'.

Performance – North Warwickshire CSP Cross-Cutting Theme – Vulnerability Serious Violence Priority – School pupils – exclusions, persistent absence and attainment

Vulnerability:

Exploitation – Offences of **child sexual exploitation** are higher than last year in the borough, with 15 reported offences during the year (six of these in Q4) compared to 8 during the whole of the previous year. However, this is a countywide trend, with increases seen across all districts and boroughs, suggesting that there is better identification of these types of offences. **Return Home Interviews** have increased again this quarter (8), with four of these having a criminal exploitation flag.

Although absence and exclusions from school are available for the first term of 2024/25 school year, these will be more reliable when there are two terms of data available.

Domestic Abuse – Reported offence volumes have increased in this latest quarter compared to the previous quarter. However, the overall annual volumes of all domestic abuse related offences are similar to the 2023/24 year.

Hate crime – Reported offence volumes are similar in this latest quarter compared to the previous quarter. Overall annual volumes are similar to the 2023/24 year. Racist related hate crime remains the most prominent in North Warwickshire Borough (43 reports), following the county trend. Sexual orientation is the second highest hate crime type (14 reports) so far this year. There have been 12 reports of prejudice related incidents in school so far this financial year. Where stated, all were relating to racism. This is the second lowest volume of reports in the county.


ASB:

ASB TY vs LY

ASB reports to the police are overall similar to last year. This is despite higher volumes of **personal ASB** reports this year (+40%, 293 reports). The higher volumes of personal ASB are a countywide trend and although a clear reason for this is not known, it has been suggested that targeted patrolling as part of **Op Resolve** and also a revised Police Force ASB policy placing a focus on resourcing personal ASB may be contributing factors.

Nuisance ASB is lower than last year although it is still the highest volume ASB type, and **Environmental ASB** has increased (7%, 93 offences.)

Summary of Key Findings – Q4 24/25

- **Violence** offences are lower than last year, though offence volumes this quarter are the highest for violence without injury and higher than last quarter for violence with injury, which is in contrast to expected seasonal trends.
